So that was the highlight of the week,^{wks} on Saturday night all of us sitting around listening to the radio. So uh, I guess that's where I got interested in the fiddle. And uh, my Dad had, uh, my Great Grand dad's fiddle that was in the upstairs of the house here that I live in. It had laid up there for 40 years. And my great Grand dad had played this before he went to the Civil War. Then after he passed away, nobody wanted to fiddle, and my Dad said he wanted it, but he couldn't play it, so it laid up there and was never played. So I told my Dad, I'd, I'd like to learn to play the fiddle. Oh, he says, you can't never learn to play. He says, I He says, I can't play any kind of musical instrument and he says, your mother can't either, he says you'll never ever learn it, said in the first place, said the fiddles the hardest instrument to learn to play. And so I kept after kept after him told him, I wanted to learn to play the fiddle, if he got me one or fix that one up upstairs.
